## Year 12 Curriculum Enrichment Week



Year 12 started Curriculum Enrichment Week with a trip to the University of Birmingham for an undergraduate open day. This was a fantastic opportunity for our students to explore the green and spacious campus of one of our local universities. Many students were interested in attending subject talks to find out more about full range of courses, modules and options available. Students got a great insight into student life, with campus tours, visits to the accommodation village, and an opportunity to see sports facilities, social areas and much, much more. The library was a popular place to visit, and there was so much more than books and periodicals - individual study booths, seminar rooms, wellbeing suite, learning support – so much on offer to support students on their academic journey.

The open day was a fantastic way for students to launch their research and planning for their next step after NGHS6. For some this will be a gap year, an opportunity to travel and or work abroad. For others there are degree apprenticeships to explore as a way of combining study with financial independence and work. For many the array of choices of courses at universities in the UK and beyond was brought into focus.





The UCAS Fair at the NEC in Birmingham was another opportunity for our students to attend inspiring talks on the UCAS application process as well as kick-starting their research on individual universities and courses. Current students were on hand to discuss what student life is really like at hundreds of universities, and of course there were freebies galore, from tote bags to lip balm, pens, pencils and even 'Chip Spice' which Hull University was giving away (much to Mrs Glew's excitement).

We returned to school with prospectuses galore, and started a day of intense activity, as the UCAS application process was de-mystified and students registered with UCAS and started their applications. As students refined their choices, there were talks from former students for those focused on early entry (for Medicine, Veterinary, Dentistry and Oxbridge) and a presentation on apprenticeships. Later on in the day there was an informative presentation from another former NGHS student on student finance. For students studying full-time there are both Tuition Fee Loans and Maintenance Loans – both of which are applied for online next March, and students had the opportunity to ask anything they wanted about finance.

### **PERSONAL STATEMENTS**

This is the part of the UCAS application that students write themselves to showcase their skills and experience, and ultimately their suitability for their chosen options. Students spent time working on these during the week and experienced tutors were on hand to support students with any questions they had as the first drafts began to take shape. Parents and students contributed online to the process by identifying any extenuating circumstances, to contextualise our students learning journey so far, and Mrs Griffin and Mrs Glew were busy in the Sixth Form office collating the information as it arrived.

## Year 12 Curriculum Enrichment Week

### **WORK EXPERIENCE AND INTRODUCTION TO EPQ**

The Atrium was strangely quiet on Thursday with the majority of students out on work experience placements around the region. From schools to solicitors' offices to a local MP, the students who were able to contact local employers and arrange their day were rewarded with a wealth of experiences to evidence their interest in courses that they will be applying for over the coming months. Some students were able to secure virtual work experience, or participated in online workshops, and others were able to use the time in school to focus on their UCAS application.

Friday morning started with an informative introduction to EPQ delivered by Miss Pritchard. As Y12 students know, the Extended Project Qualification is an opportunity for students to carry out their own detailed research and produce a written report (or create an artefact and write a shorter report) on a topic not covered by their A Level courses. Having chosen their areas of study, students have been refining their research questions and meeting with their project supervisor to discuss the work that they will carry out over the Summer. Miss Pritchard discussed with students how to analyse and evaluate academic research, and importantly how to reference their work using the Harvard referencing system.

The chateau was a lovely place to stay and the scenery and building it self was just beautiful. I definitely don't regret signing up to this trip.








## German MFL Day for Year 8




As part of Curriculum Enrichment Week, the students who did not go on residential trips had a day learning about a key event in German sporting history.

In the afternoon they worked in groups and researched life in the 1950s post war choosing topics such as fashion, music -rock and roll, food, cars etc. They collated this information into a poster and presented to the other groups.







## Year 7 at Poole's Cavern - Peak District

In glorious sunshine, the year seven pupils had a chance to visit Poole's Cavern in Buxton as part of their geography studies. A two million year old natural limestone cave, Poole's cavern was a chance for the students to learn about stalactite and stalagmite formation as well as the various inhabitants and uses of the cavern over the last 15,000 years! They also learned about the production of limestone in the surrounding hills and the fearful conditions the 18th century workers had to endure!

The cavern gets it's name form a notorious 17th Century highwayman who used it as a hideout. However it has also been used by Bronze Age settlers for winter shelter and the Romans turned it into a shrine to a water goddess. Students had the chance to view some ancient artefacts in the small museum as well as take some very impressive pictures!


# Year 7 'Show in a Day!'



## What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Gambling can be defined as betting or risking money or something of value on the outcome of a situation involving chance. Under current regulations, gambling is legal for adults in the UK. Its potential impacts on the wellbeing of individuals, families and communities are well documented – emphasising the importance of safeguarding children and young people against these hazards.

#### **MANIPULATIVE ADVERTISING**

dverts for online bookmakers and betting Adverts for online bookmakers and betting vulnerable groups, fostering addiction, promoting misleading expectations, impacting mental health, affecting social norms, posing regulatory challenges, influencing minors and other ethical issues. Effective regulation, responsible advertising practices and public education are essential to mitigate these concerns and address the potential harms associated with excessive exposure to manipulative advertising practices. exposure to manipulative advertisements.

#### **ADDICTIVE FEATURES**

All gambling products carry safety concerns, but some can be even riskier and more addictive. The frequency with which people can place bets can encourage them to do so often – with rapid spins and multiple betting options, for example. Betting on sports events, especially with live in-play betting options, can be highly engaging and habit forming. The 24/7 availability of online platforms can also increase the risk of excessive gambling, particularly graphs young people. particularly among young people.

#### **PEER PRESSURE**

Exposure to gambling through friends, influencers or social circles can normalise risky behaviour and create unrealistic expectations about the chances of winning. Addressing peer influence requires support services, responsible advertising practices and effective education on the subject to minimise the impact on children and promote healthier choices.

#### IMPACT ON MENTAL HEALTH

Gambling can exacerbate mental health issues Gambling can exacerbate mental health issues such as anxiety, depression, and stress – especially if it leads to financial loss. Individuals with existing mental health conditions may use gambling as a coping mechanism – but the cycle of gambling can worsen their symptoms, creating a detrimental impact on overall wellbeing. Integrated support services and treatment options are crucial to address these interconnected challenges affectively. interconnected challenges effectively

#### **GATEWAY BEHAVIOURS**

Certain features of other products – such as video games that offer in-game purchases – can lead to gambling among young people. These mechanisms can sometimes be designed to exploit psychological vulnerabilities, encouraging repeated spending to acquire virtual items or advantages. Such practices can normalise the associated risks and desensitise young people to putting their or their family's money in danger.

#### FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES

The most common impacts of online betting come in the form of financial losses and debt. This, in turn, can lead to distorted perceptions of money, deterioration of relationships, social isolation, and poor academic and career outcomes. Regular gambling can even exacerbate other risky behaviour by making it seem less significant – potentially leading to a cascade of health impacts and financial loss.

## Advice for Parents & Educators

#### **ENCOURAGE OPEN DISCUSSIONS**

Sporting events can be a good opening for conversations about gambling, as some sponsorships may reference and even glamourise it. Talk to children about how these promotions make them feel and encourage frequent conversations about any concerns they may have. Adverts, influencers and online platforms may also feature gambling products. As a child grows, it's important to encourage their critical thinking skills to help them avoid being manipulated by this type of marketing.

#### MONITOR SPENDING

In-game purchases can be appealing to children, allowing them to unlock new features or cosmetic items in a fraction of the time it would take to win them by playing. Talk to children about how they spend money online; an interest in what video games they play can encourage the conversation. Consider setting up restrictions on their devices, requiring their parent or carer's permission before making any purchases. Talk about finances regularly and openly.

### KNOW THE WARNING SIGNS

Parents and educators should be vigilant for signs of gambling harm among young people. Look for changes in their behaviour such as increased secrecy, unexplained money issues, mood swings or withdrawal from their usual activities. Open conversations about gambling risks and maintain a supportive, non-judgemental environment. Try to familiarise yourself with resources and helplines for assistance

#### **GET FURTHER SUPPORT**

Your GP and local NHS gambling clinic are also available if you require additional advice. Don't hesitate to reach out for help if you're concerned about a child's gambling behaviour or their financial situation.


