I always find myself saying this, but... it has been a busy couple of weeks at NGHS since the last edition of Newport News!

At the beginning of last week, the school came together in the Hall for a fiercely competitive benchball tournament arranged by our three new Young Enterprise Teams. It was a really fun event to be involved in, though the Sixth Form teams involved were a bit too strong for my liking and came out as the deserved winners!

We also held our Sixth Form Open Evening and Presentation Ceremony last week. The Sixth Form Open Evening was very well attended, with students joining us from a variety of schools across Shropshire, Telford and Wrekin and beyond. We currently have our largest ever Sixth Form and it is pleasing to see that we continue to have high levels of interest in our outstanding provision for September.

The presentation afternoon was a wonderful occasion to celebrate the successes and achievements of our students, and it was nice to see that so many of the NGHS family (former staff and parents) were able to come and join those celebrations with us. Our guest speaker this year was former student, Rachel Raybould -Dear. Rachel left NGHS in 2017 and has since qualified as a Commercial Property Solicitor. As well as hearing about her journey to get to her chosen career, it was clear that Rachel's passion for the school remains and NGHS will forever be in her heart.

Our Year 11 students have been fantastic this week during their mock examination period. As we have said to them, mock exams are an important part of the

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GCSE year in terms of the valuable feedback they will receive from staff on the areas that have gone well and where further improvements can be made. As well as this, it is an opportunity to test their systems for managing a concentrated examination period. This includes planning to use the time they have effectively, being able to shift concentration from one subject to another and embedding good habits that will support their wellbeing during the summer exams such as sleeping well, eating healthily and incorporating downtime into their revision timetables.

And if that wasn't enough... then we had the snow! It is always a big decision to make as a headteacher, whether to open or not, when we have snow forecast or just wake to see the garden covered with snow in the morning. We will always try to open when it is safe to do so, and I will continue to send messages through Edulink to confirm either way. We aim to do this as early as possible following consultation with the site team, Lakeside coaches and liaison with the other Newport secondary school headteachers. Having said that, it was lovely to see the whole school enjoying some time on the field in the snow and sunshine on Wednesday lunchtime; you are clearly never too old to build a snowman, or a snow snail, as the case may be!

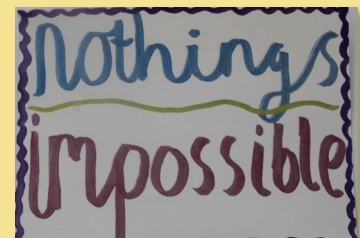
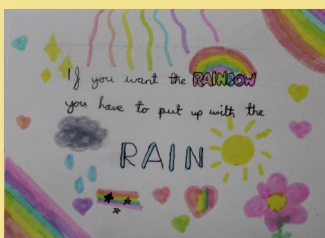


Year 7 Information Evening

ICELAND TRIP 2024

On the last day of half term, geographers from year 9 to year 12 set off to Iceland for 4 days! We departed from school nice and early on the Friday morning, and even with the early start we were all full of energy due to the excitement of the trip (which us year 12s had been waiting for 2 years to go on due to covid, adding to our excitement). After a nice morning at the airport, and a

stable flight, we arrived in Iceland just after midday. We could already tell how beautiful the country was going to be based on the glimpse we got as we flew over, and the views from the coach as we went to our first stop of the trip.

Our first activity on the trip was a visit to the Perlan museum. Here we learnt about the glacial formations in Iceland, and we got to go into an ice cave, which was -15°C . The museum had a balcony around the top, and from here we could see for miles over Reykjavik, Iceland's capital. On our way out of the museum, we were given some Icelandic chocolate, which was a nice snack before our next stop. After the museum, we went to bowling, which was our evening activity. Some games got very competitive, and even with my best effort, I unfortunately lost. Tea that night was amazing as we had pizzas at the bowling alley, and everyone left feeling excited for what the next 3 days entailed. We were all wowed when we arrived at the hotel that night. It was a beautiful wooden cabin style hotel, and the year 12's had family rooms, which even had sofas in. It was a great start to the trip!



Day 2 of the trip was an action-packed day! Our tour guide 'God' made sure we learnt everything we could on our coach journeys and helped us round when we arrived at our different activities. The first activity of the day was a trip to the lava museum. I found this particularly interesting as volcanoes have always fascinated me. The museum taught us about lots of Iceland's major volcanoes, and about recent explosions of these volcanoes. We learnt about the geological processes which transform Iceland's landscape and structure, and it really helped to show us the application of theories we'd learnt in class. Next on our agenda was the Skogafoss waterfall, one of three waterfalls we would visit over the weekend. It was a phenomenal site, and something I would recommend to anyone. After thinking nothing could top the site of the waterfall, we visited the Solheimajokull glacier. Seeing a glacier in person was amazing, and it is something I think we all appreciated as Mrs Gill reminded

us that glaciers like the ones we saw are disappearing due to climate change. This is another way we linked our class learning to real life. Our final visit of the day has to have been my favourite part of the whole trip. We visited the Seljalandsfoss waterfall. This waterfall is particularly special as you are able to walk behind it, giving you a completely new view of the waterfall. The waterfall also had 'mini' falls which would veer off from the main waterfall, and if you stood in the right place, you could experience this! Unfortunately for Mr Twiss he was stood in the right place for this, and he wished he had stayed being with Mrs Gill and Mrs Barker after he got drenched.



Day 3 was equally as packed, and with an early start in -3°C , we made our way to the

mid-Atlantic ridge, the area where the North American plate meets the Eurasian plate. It was nice to see a plate boundary which we had learnt about in class in real life, and it was incredible to know that we had stood on both sides of the plates within the same hour! We experienced even more beauty when we went to Thingvellir national park. This area showed us even more of the two tectonic plates, and showed us even more of the Icelandic beauty. We all got coins to make wishes in the wishing well well, a slightly different concept than what we are used to, as you do not wish for yourself, but for the wellness of others. We also saw the place of the first parliaments, and we saw why this location was chosen due to the natural amphitheatre. It was another great part of the trip knowing we had visited the location of the first parliament meetings.

After this we visited Geyser. This is another highlight of the trip, as seeing the Geyser explode was incredible and showed us another one of the power of nature in Iceland. Our last waterfall visit of the trip was to the Gullfoss water fall. I would say this was the most beautiful waterfall we visited on the trip, and it was also the most powerful. It was a stunning view when rainbows formed near the fall,



and it was even better when the sun rays hit in the right spots. Finally, our last place to visit was the Fontana spa. This was a relaxing way to end the trip, even for the brave souls who dared to dip into the freezing cold lake next to the spa!

After leaving the spa, we made our way back to the hotel for our last night in Iceland, all of us feeling upset to be leaving such a beautiful country. Iceland was amazing and it is a location I would recommend anyone to visit, its natural beauty was unforgettable, and it was a really nice way to see our learning in real life! **Aimee C** (Year 12)

BEEKEEPING WHEN IT'S TOO COLD!

Once the temperature drops below about 14°C the bees tend to stay in the hives, when it drops further they huddle around the queen and use the stores they have collected to generate enough heat to keep the cluster warm. As a result beekeepers will not open up the hives when the temperature is low so they do not cool down the cluster and lose the bees. The only thing they will do is check the weight of the hive and add bee fondant to on top of the crown board if needed.

As a result the bee keeping club will not be visiting the hives until late spring; instead we start preparing for next year and using bee products other than honey. Last week we started making candles using both wax foundation (the sheets of wax that bee

keeper put in hives to help the bees start producing comb) and blocks of wax (produced by melting down old comb). With wax foundation, warm a bit of the foundation to soften it and then fold one edge over a wick and then roll it up. With blocks of wax, melt it in a pan over hot water and then pour it into a mold which has a wick placed through it, then when solid remove it from the mold.

We will probably sell a few for Christmas decorations- watch this space.

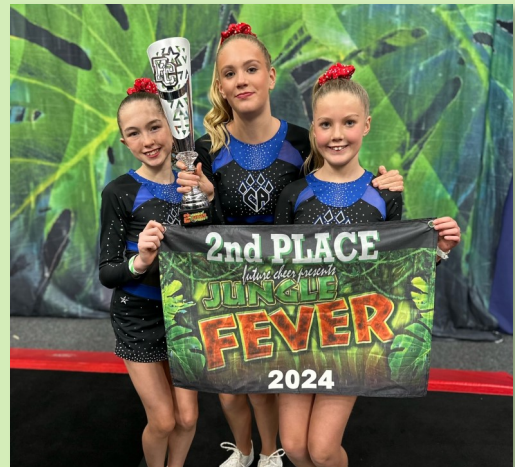


GREAT START TO NEW SEASON
